SUBJECT: President's Report to the Board: June 2011

I'm pleased to provide the following update on key developments and achievements since the last meeting of the Board on April 28, 2011:

1. "Putting Students First": Ontario's Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities, John Milloy, has unveiled the Province's new five-year plan for post-secondary education titled "Putting Students First," which builds upon Ontario's 2005 "Reaching Higher" plan. The new plan's key goals include: expanding credit transfer opportunities; developing more collaborative and joint college/university options; supporting online learning through the Ontario Online Institute; pursuing new teaching quality and experiential learning initiatives; increasing the number of international students who study in Ontario; and adding 60,000 new student spaces (including 6,000 graduate spaces).

Minister Milloy has also communicated the potential for exploring how the funding formula for Ontario universities might be changed to take a more system-wide approach that recognizes the particular strengths of individual institutions and supports quality initiatives as well as growth. In addition, for the first time in the Province's history, post-secondary institutions will be considered as part of the government's long-term capital funding commitments. These are positive signals for Western and our sister institutions, and we look forward to engaging further with the government to advance these important goals.

2. **Student enrolment:** The acceptance rates of our offers to qualified first-year students for 2011-2012 has increased overall relative to last year, and we are presently projecting an entering class of approximately 5,100 for the coming academic year. This compares to our initial projections that estimated an overall increase from our previous first-year intake target of 4,350 up to 4,800. Key growth areas include health sciences, biological and medical sciences, social science, and management and organizational studies. It should also be noted that 600 fewer offers were extended this year compared to last, and the cut-off for entering grades was raised from 81% to 82% with a view to maintaining and strengthening the quality of our undergraduate student body. As well, our admissions team is working hard to retain those international students who have accepted offers so far and we appear to be tracking well against our international enrolment target for 2011.

This is a very good news story for Western that can be attributed to several factors. Our university continues to attract positive media coverage on several fronts that strengthens our reputation, including our ninth consecutive top ranking among Canada's large research-intensive schools in the annual *Globe and Mail* survey of undergraduate university students. In addition, our faculty, administrative support units, and recruitment and admissions staff have all done an outstanding job

in engaging prospective students and their families to demonstrate that Western is an excellent choice for pursuing their undergraduate education.

- 3. International rankings: Western's departments of Philosophy, History, Geography, and English were each recently named among the best in the world according to QS World University Rankings, which are based on academic and employer reputation surveys as well as research citations. The top-200 list of universities offering Arts and Humanities degrees placed Philosophy and History among the 100 best in the world, English among the top 150, and Geography among the top 200. In previously released QS rankings for disciplines in the Life Sciences & Medicine, Western's department of Psychology ranked among the top 100. Other Western departments that fared well in the QS rankings include Computer Science & Information Systems and Civil & Structural Engineering, each of which placed among the top 150 in the Engineering and Technology category, while Mathematics placed among the top 150 in the Natural Sciences category. This kind of recognition raises Western's profile on the international stage and helps us attract the best students and faculty to our campus.
- 4. International education: Senate has approved, and is recommending to the Board, the creation of a new senior administrative position to focus on enhancing the international presence on our campus. The new role of Vice-Provost & Associate Vice-President (International Education) will report jointly to the Provost and Vice-President (Academic) and the Vice-President (Research & International Relations). Specific responsibilities of the incumbent, once hired, will include international student recruitment, international student services, education abroad, and education partnerships. In developing the new position, models provided by several leading research-intensive universities in Canada, the U.S. and Australia that have been successful in their internationalization efforts were considered for what might work best within the Western context.
- 5. **International partnerships:** A new cooperation agreement promoting scientific research projects between Western, the University of Toronto, and the São Paulo Research Foundation (FAPESP) was recently announced in Ottawa. As one of Brazil's main research-funding agencies for science, FAPESP's mission is to foster scientific research in all fields of knowledge by awarding scholarships, fellowships and grants to investigators linked to higher education and research institutions in the State of São Paulo, Brazil. In 2010, FAPESP approved 11,555 projects worth \$500 million (U.S.), up 5% from 2009.

As well, Western recently consolidated its research strengths on the world's second-largest continent with the opening of a new institute. With the goal of advancing scholarship and policy development activities related to society, politics, economy, culture and health, Western's Africa Institute celebrated its official opening May 3 at an event hosted by the University of Nairobi (Kenya). Through agreements with close to 40 African universities, the institute will promote research by bringing international scholars to Western, creating symposiums, publishing papers, and providing opportunities for study and research in Africa.

- 6. **Decanal selections:** Decanal Selection Committees have recently undertaken the initial stages of their work for the Faculties of Arts and Humanities, and Information & Media Studies, while the search for a new Dean of Law continues.
- 7. **National accolades:** Western recently received provincial and national accolades from the Canadian Forces Liaison Council (CFLC) as the *Most Supportive Employer Ontario*, and the *Most Supportive Employer in Canada* for 2011. The CFLC's mandate is to enhance the availability of reservists for their military duties by obtaining the support and co-operation of organization leaders in Canada. The Council encourages civilian employers and educational institutions to grant reservists time off on a voluntary basis, without penalty, to allow them to participate in military duties and training.
