Linguistics at Western



What is Linguistics?

Linguistics is the study of the structures and uses of language. Linguists study every aspect of language including: language acquisition, language processing in the brain, speech sounds, word structure, sentence structure, the organization of conversations, how we make meaning with language, how we play with language, how languages change over time, variations in how people speak the same language in different ways, and language disorders. Linguistics is concerned with describing the rule-governed structures of languages and determining the extent to which these structures are universal or specific to particular languages or social contexts.

Why Study Linguistics at Western?

The study of linguistics is essential for anyone interested in a particular language or in a discipline with a focus on language in general. Students in many different fields of study find that linguistics makes an interesting and engaging elective or optional course. It is excellent preparation for law school or journalism, for example. Linguistics courses are especially helpful for careers in language teaching (such as a Bachelors of Education, or TESL certification), in communicative disorders (including both Audiology and Speech Pathology), in translation and in interpreting.

The inter-faculty Program in Linguistics at Western allows students to combine the study of linguistics with any other subject area. Courses in linguistics that are currently taught in a number of departments in the Faculties of Social Science and Arts & Humanities can be counted towards a Major or a Minor in Linguistics. Western also offers an Honors Specialization in Linguistics for students interested in pursuing graduate studies.
