3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Course description and list of topics

This graduate course will cover principles of molecular plant-microbe interactions (MPMI), with a focus on understanding the molecular mechanisms of the plant immune system. Topics may include (but are not limited to):

- Pattern-triggered immunity
- Effector-triggered immunity
- Immune receptors in plants
- Bacterial, fungal, oomycete, herbivore, and/or viral pathogens of plants
- Pathogen effectors and the suppression of immunity
- Engineering disease resistance
- Commensals and the microbiome

Class will be held in-person 2 hours/week.
