Course Information

Biology for Sciences I (B1001A), FW25 is offered in-person format. Certain digital platforms used (SimUText and MindTap) will require students to work online. Lectures are synchronous and in-person in the rooms specified above. Students will attend live session with the professor twice per week (Mon-Wed or Tue-Thurs, depending on their Western Timetable) where they will watch the lecture, take notes and participate in some active learning. Skill Development (Labs) sessions are delivered synchronously in person. Office hours will be delivered in-person (date, time and room locations are all posted on the OWL course site).

Grade 12U (SB14U) Biology or Grade 11U (SB13UA) Biology and permission of the Department. A minimum mark of 80% in Grade 12 U Biology (SB14U) is recommended for students registered in a faculty other than the Faculty of Science. Note: The combination of Biology 1001A and 1002B (with appropriate marks) are the prerequisites for senior Biology courses and admission to modules offered by the Department of Biology and the Basic Medical Science Departments

- 6. Apply scientific experimental design, equipment, skills and analyses to test hypotheses.
- 7. Locate, evaluate, and extract scientific ideas from academic and non-academic literature; ethically incorporate such ideas into academic work.

You don't need both electronic and print copies of the textbook. But if you wish to purchase both you may do so. You have the option to use a second-hand version of the 5th edition print copy if you wish.

All materials are available for purchase at the uwo bookstore (online or in-person). If you are taking B1002B next term you don't need to purchase another textbook. The same textbook is used for both B1001A and B1002B.

A Personal Response System called "iClickers" will be used during lectures. This resource is free. They are for class participation only and do not count for grades. Participation is encouraged but not mandatory.

Technical Requirements

Your weekly OWL quizzes and lab assignments and other digital tools will require you to have a working computer with a very stable internet connection. A computer is camera is helpful in case you need to go on a Zoom call.

5. Methods of Evaluation

The overall course grade will be calculated as listed below:

OWL Quizzes 12% Skill Development 20% Midterm Exam 33% Final Exam 35%

The Midterm Exam will cover material from Cycles 1-5, inclusive. The midterm will take place Saturday, October 18, 2025 from 2:00 – 4:00 PM (Room numbers will be posted on OWL Brightspace closer to the midterm date). There will be a midterm make-up exam (exact date, time and room will be posted on OWL Brightspace closer to October). The make-up exam is not a rewrite. It is only for those students who did not write the originally scheduled midterm. In order to miss the midterm, you MUST submit your Academic Consideration request using the Student Absence Portal. This is mandatory. Here is the URL for the student absence portal:

Failure to do so will lead to a grade of zero on the midterm. Once your request is approved, you will receive permission to write the make-up midterm. Undocumented absences are not accepted for this assessment. You must provide documentation for your reason of absence

IMPORTANT: In order to pass the course, you must write the final exam, pass the skill development portion of the course (a pass grade in skills is 60% and not missing more than 1 skills session) and receive an overall course grade of 50% or above. You CANNOT pass the course if you haven't written the final exam. If you do not pass skill development but receive an overall course grade of 50% (with final exam) or above, you will receive an incomplete grade (called INC) and you must repeat **only** the skill development portion of the course (not the entire course) within the next 2 future offerings of the course (summer 2026 or fall 2026). Exceptions may be made if you need to complete it after fall 2026. If you failed the course (or choose to repeat the course to improve your grade) and have passed skill development (60% or over), then you can transfer your skill development grade to your next course attempt. Your passing skill development grade from your previous attempt will be applied to your

repeated attempt while calculating your final course grade (in other words, you don't have to repeat skills if you passed it).

IMPORTANT: If you miss more than 1 skill development session in B1001A, you will not pass the skill development portion of the course. In order to pass skill development, you cannot miss more than 1 session.

Alternate grading

Since the Final Exam is cumulative, you can get 2 chances to show your understanding of the course content. For example, if you do better on the final exam, half the weight of the midterm (16.5%) will be transferred to the Final Exam weight. If you miss the Midterm, the weighting of your final grade will change. As shown in the Table below, we will calculate your Final Grade in 2 different ways and whichever distribution works in your favour will be your final grade (ie, the highest grade). Weights below don't include Quizzes (12%) and Skill Development (20%).

Bonus Grades

The Canadian Consortium of Science Equity Scholars (CCSES) is conducting a pan-Canadian study of first-year science courses at various post-secondary institutions. The study explores students' perceptions of the classroom climate, sense of belonging, and course outcomes to identify features of inclusive and equitable STEM courses. We highly encourage you to participate and receive your bonus marks. There will be a total of 2 surveys (one in the beginning of the term and the other at the end of the term). You will earn 0.25 marks for each survey for a total of 0.5 marks. There may be additional surveys that you can complete for bonus marks (details will be announced during the course). Please note the maximum final course grade (with bonus) that you can receive in the course is 100%.

Missed OWL Quizzes:

The OWL Quizzes are assessment with a **built-in flexibility** (10% bonus will be added to everyone's overall quiz grade to compensate for loss due to missed quizzes). Whether you missed a quiz or not, all students will receive the 10% bonus. The quizzes are due one every Sunday at 11:00 PM EST (with the exception of midterm weekend and reading week). Since there is build-in flexibility for these quizzes, you CANNOT request Academic Consideration in form of deadline extension or reweighing of grades.. There are no make-up quizzes. If you miss a quiz, you will receive a grade of zero for that particular missed quiz. The quiz is delivered asynchronously on OWL (testing window is Thurs - Sun). Choose the day that is convenient for you to complete and submit the quiz. If you are not able to complete a quiz and miss it, we will compensate for your missed quizzes by adding 10% bonus to your overall quiz grade at the end of the term (to a maximum of 100%; you cannot receive a grade beyond 100%). There are various reasons for which you may miss a quiz (medical absence, technical difficulties, forgetting to submit, error in submitting, religious holidays, varsity event, other commitments). The 10% bonus will make-up for any quiz that you missed for whichever reason applies to you.

Missed Skill Development Sessions (Labs)

Labs in this course are called "Skill Development" (or Skills for short). If you need to miss a skills session, you must <u>submit your request through the student absence portal.</u> This is mandatory otherwise you will receive a grade of zero for the missed session. <u>Undocumented absence CANNOT</u> be applied to request academic consideration for skills. You must provide documentation for your reason of absence.

Once you have submitted your request, you will receive an automated confirmation email to let you know if it has been approved or denied. If approved, the confirmation email will provide you with information about a possible make-up date. If you are concerned or worried for any reason, please contact the skill development coordinator, Ms. Winona Gadapati, at wgadapa2@uwo.ca no more than 48 hours after your scheduled lab session that you missed or will be missing.

If you miss any skill development session during the term, you will not qualify for bonus skill development grades that **may or may not be given** at the end of the term. The only way to receive the **potential** bonus grade is to attend all skill development sessions without missing a single one.

IMPORTANT: If you miss more than 1 skill development session in B1002B, you will NOT pass the skill development portion of the course. In order to pass skill development you cannot miss more than 1 session.

Missed Midterm

There is one midterm exam in this course worth 33% of the overall course grade. It will take place in October. If you miss the midterm without academic consideration, you will receive a grade of zero. If you miss the Midterm WITH academic consideration, then you will be qualified to write the make-up midterm.

There is a Make-up for the Midterm Exam. Make-up midterm is only available to students who have been granted academic consideration to miss the midterm.

It is important to note that Make-up midterm is not a rewrite. In other words, if you wrote the originally scheduled Midterm, you are not permitted to write the make-up midterm. Therefore, if you think you cannot write the midterm for any reason, you MUST submit your request to miss the midterm via the student absence portal. Once you write the originally scheduled midterm, it is too late to get exemption and reweighing of your final grade! If you miss the midterm without academic consideration, you will receive a grade of zero. If you miss the midterm WITH academic consideration you will have permission to write the Make-up midterm. If you cannot write the make-up midterm you need to obtain ANOTHER academic consideration via the student absence portal in order to be excused from writing the make-up midterm. If you miss BOTH the regular midterm and the Make-up midterm with academic consideration, the weight of the midterm will be transferred to your Final Exam.

If you need to miss the midterm, you must <u>submit your request through the student absence portal</u>. This is mandatory otherwise you will receive a grade of zero on the midterm. Undocumented absence CANNOT be applied to request academic consideration for midterm. You must provide documentation for your reason of absence.

Absences from Final Examinations

There is one final exam in this course worth 35% of the overall course grade. It will take place in December. If you miss the final exam without academic consideration, you will receive a grade of zero. If you miss the final exam WITH academic consideration, then you will be qualified to write the make-up final.

There is a Make-up for the Final Exam. Make-up final is only available to students who have been granted academic consideration to miss the final exam in the original scheduled date.

It is important to note that Make-up final is not a rewrite. In other words, if you wrote the originally scheduled final, you are not permitted to write the make-up final. Therefore, if you think you cannot write the final for any reason, you MUST submit your request to miss the final via the student absence portal. Once you write the originally scheduled final, it is too late to get exemption and reweighing of your final grade! If you miss the final without academic consideration, you will receive a grade of zero. If you miss the final WITH academic consideration you will have permission to write the Make-up final. If you cannot write the make-up final you need to obtain ANOTHER academic consideration via the student absence portal in order to be excused from writing the make-up final. If you miss BOTH the regular final and the Make-up final with academic consideration, your grade will be entered as "SPC". You will have the opportunity to write the final exam during the next offering of the course after which your SPC grade will be changed to your numerical grade.

If you need to miss the final exam, you must <u>submit your request through the student absence</u> <u>portal</u>. This is mandatory otherwise you will receive a grade of zero on the final exam. Undocumented absence CANNOT be applied to request academic consideration for the final exam. You must provide documentation for your reason of absence.
