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

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Field School Curriculum: Finds Processing

Finds processing: students will take part in processing archaeological material such as washing pottery and animal bone and learning to perform flotation on environmental samples

Material analysis: students will learn how to recognize various types of Roman artefacts in the field and keep journals of daily records of their part of the excavation. Ox skulls excavated from a pit dug in the floor of a large central courtyard building, ca. AD 220



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

Credit and Academic Expectations

• 2 Components:

- Summer Field Season: .5 Credit (register in winter term)
 - 5-week program
 - Field excavation Monday-Friday
 - Saturday field trips to historical sites
 - Graded assignments include:
 - Site presentations
 - Excavation journal
 - Recording and site survey assignment
 - Exam on history of Vindolanda and Roman Britain

Fall research course (recommended but not mandatory): .5 Credit

- Independent meetings with Prof. Greene
- Significant research paper on Roman Britain, the Roman Army, Vindolanda, or the Roman Frontiers.

Program Fees: TBA

Includes:

- Accommodation in self-catering cottages for full 5-week program
- All session fees associated with taking part in excavation at Vindolanda, which includes excavation t-shirt, tea, coffee and cookies at breaks.
- 'Friends of Vindolanda' membership allows students access to the Vindolanda site and museum and The Roman Army Museum all year, %10 discount in shop and café, newsletters throughout the year.
- Special group dinners, e.g. opening and closing night celebrations, cultural nights, some meals on field trips.
- All ground travel during the 5-week program for travel to and from site daily, and field trips around northern Britain
- Entrance fees to all museums and sites visited
- Specialist lectures and site/museum tours
- Books, course pack, and supplies such as site journals
- Courses on individual sub fields in archaeology (Bioarchaeology, Archaeological illustration) with specialists in each field

Expenses not included

- International travel to the course location: about \$1000-\$1200 should be budgeted for flight and ground travel
 - see 'Boarding Pass' program at Western which helps pay for international travel.
- Food: \$500-\$700 for the 5 weeks
 - The cottages are self-catering so that people may cater to their individual tastes
 - We suggest students join together for dinner and lunches as the most economical option
- Spending money: Individual needs
 - Personal travel
 - Personal purchases while in the UK, etc.

Scholarships Available

Western internal Global Opportunities awards (GO)

- \$1000-\$2000 scholarships available
- Eligibility: open to all students on campus
 - 100-200 available scholarships each year
- There are a few donor supported scholarships of \$2000 available specifically for some Field School participants
- "Boarding Pass" (International Learning Awards)
 - \$1000 scholarship available to cover students' travel abroad
 - Competition requirements: open to all students on campus (with some requirements like grade average of 70%)
 - All students are guaranteed this scholarship if they have the correct average
 - Can only receive one "Boarding Pass" during career at Western

Scholarships for Classics Majors and Honors Specialization students

O'Donnell Scholarship

- Scholarship for any study abroad program
- Competition requirements: For program students in Classics, French, and Comparative Literature departments
- 2-3 scholarships available each summer
- Amount varies depending on year and applications received

National and International Scholarships

Archaeological Institute of America

- Waldbaum Excavation Scholarships
 - \$1000 per scholarship
 - Open to first-time excavators only
 - Competition: North American wide
 - 8-10 scholarships available each year
 - Deadline: March 1, 2025

Toronto AIA Society Shaw Scholarships

- \$500 scholarships available
- Competition: Usually, applications come from students around the southern Ontario area
- A few scholarships available (in the range of 2)

Scholarships

Western Department of Classical Studies

- Archaeological Excavation Fund
 - This fund changes from year to year depending on the generosity of personal donors to the department
 - Allocations change from year to year and are based on availability, need, and number of applicants.
