Land Acknowledgment

We acknowledge that the University of Western Ontario is situated on the traditional territories of the Anishinaabek, Haudenosaunee, Lünaapéewak and Chonnonton Nations who have longstanding relationships to this land and place. London's land is also connected to the Sombra and London Township Treaties of 1796 and the Dish with One Spoon Covenant Wampum.

The First Nations communities of our local area include Chippewas of the Thames First Nation, Oneida Nation of the Thames, and Munsee Delaware Nation. In the southern Ontario region, there are eleven First Nations communities and a growing Indigenous urban population. Western University values the significant historical and contemporary contributions of local and regional First Nations and all of the original peoples of Turtle Island. Acknowledging territory shows recognition and respect for Indigenous peoples' unique rights, which is an essential step toward establishing healthy reciprocal relations necessary to achieving equity and reconciliation, and for respecting longstanding relationships that Indigenous peoples have to this land, as they are the original caretakers. It is also important to acknowledge historical and ongoing injustices that Indigenous Peoples, including First Nations, Métis and Inuit, endure in Canada, and seek out means to redress these.

Reconnaissance des territoires traditionnels

Nous tenons à reconnaître que l'Université Western Ontario est située sur les territoires traditionnels des nations Anishinabek, Haudenosaunee, Lunapewak et Chonnonton, qui entretiennent des relations de longue date avec ces terres et cet emplacement. Le territoire de London est également soumis aux traités du Sombra et London Township de 1796, ainsi qu'au traité de la ceinture wampum (« Dish with One Spoon »).

La région locale abrite plusieurs communautés des Premières nations – notamment la nation des Chippewas de la Thames, la nation Oneida de la Thames, de même que la nation Munsee-Delaware. Au sud de l'Ontario, on compte onze communautés des Premières nations, ainsi qu'une population autochtone urbaine croissante. L'université Western valorise les contributions importantes des Premières nations locales – tant historiques qu'actuelles – ainsi que les contributions de tous les peuples originaires de l'île de la Tortue. La reconnaissance du territoire est une marque de respect envers les droits uniques des peuples autochtones : ceci est indispensable à l'établissement de relations saines et réciproques et à la poursuite de l'équité et de la réconciliation. La reconnaissance permet en outre de respecter les relations de longue date que les peuples autochtones entretiennent avec ces terres, vu qu'ils en sont les intendants originaux. Il importe également de reconnaître les injustices historiques et actuelles que subissent les peuples autochtones – notamment les Premières nations, les Métis et les Inuit – et de chercher à réparer celles-ci.

Statement on Harassment
