3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Course Description

This course is intended to be a complement to 3321F (my course on *Paradise Lost*), though neither course is a prerequisite for the other and it does not matter in which order they are taken, should any students decide to take both. The course will fall into three parts: 1) a close reading of the early poems (especially "L'Allegro" and "II Penseroso," *A Masque Presented at Ludlow Castle [Comus]*, "Lycidas", and the English sonnets); 2) a close reading of *Areopagitica*, Milton's prose pamphlet defending free speech; 3) a close reading of *Paradise Regained* and *Samson Agonistes*. Emphasis throughout the course will be placed on Milton's lasting relevance for our own time. 3 hours, 0.5 course

Learning Outcomes

John Milton is the most learned English poet, but his poetry warns us to be suspicious of sharp sophisters who promise to deliver "learning outcomes." Eve lost Paradise when she fell for the line: "Ye shall be as gods, knowing both good and evil as they know." Satan again pushes "learning outcomes" in *Paradise Regained*, when he offers to teach Jesus all about Greek philosophy. To the dismay of many critics, Jesus turns him down: "Think not but that I know these things, or think / I know them not; not therefore am I short / Of knowing what I ought" (4.286-8). Jesus adds that Socrates was the "wisest" philosopher because he "professed / To know this only, that he nothing knew" (4.293-4). Milton in *Areopagitica* insists that true learning consists of the process, not the outcome. "Truth," he writes, "is compared in Scripture to a streaming fountain; if her waters flow not in a perpetual progression, they sicken into a muddy pool of conformity and tradition." Who should we trust? Satan? Or Milton and Socrates? I never tell students what to think, but this course just might equip you with sufficient learning to decide for yourselves. You will at least learn how to unravel the knotty grammar and syntax of the lines I have just quoted.

Participation 10%

This class meets twice a week. Students should come to lecture prepared to participate in group discussion: read the assigned portions of the text in advance of class, and always bring the right text(s) to class with you.

Quizzes (15%): These will be unannounced. The number is yet to be determined (no more than 6), but only the best three will count. NB there will be **no make-up quizzes**. Make-ups are already built into the syllabus (only best three count). Quizzes will cover our current work and may be based on readings for the day the quiz is given (so **be prepared for class**).

In-class presentation (10%): I have set aside several classes (see schedule) for students to make presentations either individually or in teams of 3 or 4. Each student will speak for approximately 5 minutes. You may take opposite sides of a question (one team one side, on the other). Students will be graded individually for 1) content, 2) presentation, but the weighting will vary from student to student depending on the role you play in your team.

Essays. Late essays will be subject to a penalty of one mark per day, including weekends.

Note: there is **NO FINAL EXAM FOR THIS COURSE**. Please **do not request accommodation** for an exam that does not exist! **Do not seek accommodation for any missed quizzes.** Each quiz is worth only 5% of the final grade and so falls under the 10% threshold set by University policy on Accommodation. As noted above, make-ups are already built into the system.
