Course Description

Participants will be introduced to methods and means for creating their own personal writing discipline and creative practice. This course is crafted for students who are serious about creating an early draft or developing a work of narrative prose, a short story collection, a poetry manuscript, or a song cycle. There will be short readings from contemporary authors introduced for the purposes of inspiration and discussion. Weekly word-count based writing assignments will be produced, and workshopped in a creative and encouraging environment. This course is built on the premise that a writer learns to write through a scheduled, sustained, and supported writing practice.

Success in this course is dependent upon you attending class, participating in our feedback and discussions, and, of course, you creating and cementing your own writing discipline and practice.

Objectives:

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Develop a personal writing discipline and creative practice.
- Compile an approximately 10,000 word rough draft of a work in progress.

Course Materials

Course reading materials will be (for the most part) provided via online resources/links, and will be drawn from the works of predominantly Canadian creators, with a focus on texts that use the power of word and story to centre the voices of writers that speak to issues of gender, sexuality, family, class, race, and ability. Methods of Evaluation

The grade for the course will be arrived at as follows: Final Portfolio 20%

Attendance/punctuality/participation 10% Completion of weekly writing assignments 40% Completion of readings and commentary 30% Students are fully responsible for looking at and being familiar with the information posted on the department website at <u>http://www.uwo.ca/english/undergraduate/Student%20Information.html</u>.

<u>Attendance</u>

Attendance in class is mandatory. Attendance and being on time will be a part of your grade. Students will be asked to complete weekly writing assignments (approximately 1,000 words or page equivalent for poetry or songwriting) with the goal of developing a manuscript in mind.

Accommodation Policies

Plagiarism is a major academic offence.

All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for the detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com http://www.turnitin.com.

All instances of plagiarism will be reported to the Chair of Undergraduate Studies. Proven cases of plagiarism will result in a grade of zero for the assignment. Subsequent offences will result in failure for the course.

DEADLINES – all questions/observations for each class reading are due in by 8am of the day of each class. Please schedule time to do the readings and answer the questions accordingly. Weekly 1000-word additions to your manuscript portfolio must be uploaded to the Assignment tool by noon (12pm) on the day of the class.

January 10th class introduction, in-class writing prompt, short lecture/discussion "Why Write This Anyway?", reading #1 assigned with 3 discussion questions included. Writing assignment: 1000 words for portfolio (or equivalent pages for poets) AND/OR Twitter thread assignment, details of which are listed in your assignment for this class.

January 17th Reading #1 questions are due, writing assignment must be uploaded. Short lecture/discussion about manuscript formatting, submission guidelines. Workshopping of student work. Reading #2 assigned. Writing assignment: 1000 words for portfolio.

January 24th Reading #2 questions are due, weekly writing assignment must be uploaded. Short lecture/discussion about editing practice and methods. Workshopping of student work. Reading #3 assigned. Writing assignment #3 assigned.

January 31st Reading #3 questions are due. Writing assignment #3 is due. PLEASE NOTE details of this week's writing assignment. Class discussion about writing about real people, writer's block, confronting common writerly fears. Student self-evaluation of portfolio progress. Reading #4 assigned. Writing assignment: 1000 words for portfolio.

February 7th Reading #4 questions are due, weekly writing assignment must be uploaded. Class discussion about publisher's submission guidelines, plot synopsis, query letters. Reading #5 assigned. Writing assignment 1000 words for portfolio.

February 14th Reading #5 questions are due. Weekly writing assignment must be uploaded. Workshopping of student work. Class discussion about narrative arc, outlines, order of pieces, methods and strategies for structuring a longer work or short story/poetry collection. Reading #6 assigned. Writing assignment #6 assigned.

February 28th Reading #6 questions/observations are due. At some point during this week students will be provided with a mid-term evaluation based on stated grading criteria, and individual portfolio development. Writing assignment #6 is due. PLEASE NOTE details of writing assignment for this week. Reading #7 assigned.

March 7th Reading #7 questions/observations are due. Writing assignment #7 due. Class discussion will focus on beginnings and endings. Workshopping of student work. Writing assignment: 1000 words for portfolio. Reading #8 assigned.

March 14th Reading #8 questions and observations due. Weekly writing assignment must be uploaded. Class discussion will centre around working with multiple drafts, backing up work, writing software options. Workshopping student work. Reading #9 is assigned, which is to go out and select your own favourite excerpt (max 7-10 pages) from a book or magazine and provide your own synopsis of the work, and come up with three questions to foster discussion and discourse around your selected piece. Writing assignment: 1000 words for portfolio.

March 21st Reading #9 selection and questions are due. Weekly writing assignment must be uploaded. Discussion of student's selected readings. Class discussion will be focused on where we find our inspiration, sharing of favourite books, authors, and the reasons why these books moved you. Writing assignment: 1000 words for portfolio. Reading #10 assigned.

March 28th Reading #10 questions and observations due. Workshopping student work. Writing assignment: 1000 words for portfolio.

April 4th Final writing portfolio is due. Final class discussion is about setting long term goals, finding a writing partner or group, structuring a sustainable and lasting writing discipline and creative practice.
