In order to develop a wide-ranging competency to teach and research in the field of Renaissance Non-Dramatic, candidates will prepare a reading list according to the instructions and requirements below.

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Field Exam

Students will be expected to have a thorough command of the material and a reasonably broad and representative knowledge of both sixteenth- and seventeenth-century literature in both poetry and prose. The examination will evaluate both the ability to analyze texts and the capacity to contextualize them. They should develop a sense of how and why particular authors and texts, whether conventionally deemed "major" or "minor," are worthy of attention. They should consider the ways in which texts relate to each other and to such larger issues as genre, gender, conditions of textual production, and intellectual trends (including classical and continental influences). Students should read both widely and deeply--brief acquaintance with some selections should be balanced with in-depth choices that cover both centuries but permit students to pursue individual interests (e.g. women's writing; civil war writing; rhetoric; prose fiction/romance).

Students are strongly encouraged to read some of the recommended secondary sources listed below.

2. Exam Structure

- i. Students will be asked to write THREE answers from a range of approximately ten questions.
- ii. Answers should demonstrate a reasonably broad and representative knowledge of both poetry and prose, and of both sixteenth- and seventeenth-century literature.
