Students are responsible for all of the titles on the reading list.

EXAM STRUCTURE

This examination consists of THREE questions of equal value. Please answer three questions, taking care not to write on any author in detail more than once. You may of course refer in passing to an author as often as you see fit. Provide at least THREE examples in each answer. Demonstrate as broad a range of understanding as possible in your paper as a whole.

Recommended Secondary Sources

Students are encouraged to secondary reading in preparation for the exam and should be familiar with major historical events and literary historical shifts. Suggested materials include: introductions to current scholarly editions of the texts (Penguin, Oxford World's Classics, Broadview editions, Norton editions); Blackwell Companions and Cambridge Companions of the period, its genres, and specific authors; the Cambridge Literature in Context series also includes many eighteenth-century authors: Burney, Defoe, Goldsmith, Johnson, Swift, Richardson, Wollstonecraft. The Oxford Handbook series (British Poetry 1660-1800 and select authors) is also recommended for broad overviews and contexts.

A list of other resources can be made in conjunction with the examination committee. These might include: Eve Sedgwick's *Between Men*, Leah Orr's *Novel Ventures*, Wendy Anne Lee's *Failures of Feeling* and others.
