Objectives:

This course will study some of the principal literary works written throughout the Hispanic world within a socio-cultural context from the fifteenth century to the present. Special attention will be given to how these works were adapted to film and television and received by a variety of audiences over time.

Outcomes:

Assuming students read the required texts, attend all classes and see all films, they will finish the course with a sound knowledge of Spanish literature. The principal idea behind this course is that, as modern readers, we will come to a better understanding of Hispanic artists and audiences. A desired outcome is that students improve their written and spoken Spanish while they expand their ability for critical thinking

Many of the assigned readings for the first two thirds of the course will be drawn from this bilingual anthology.

Students are expected to read other assigned primary posted on the course web site. The assigned readings will be listed as soon as the course web site is available as well as in class in January.

Grade Breakdown:

3 personal essays: 25%

Details:

- -Students will write three 300 word personal essays that will answer a question (or questions) provided by the instructor on the course web site before hand. These personal essays must not include research as they are personal reflections. The reflections will form the basis for the three oral in-class debates. Students should make 2 copies, one to be handed in on the day indicated in the outline and the other to be kept for reference during the debate. The essays are not to be read during the oral debate.
- -The research essay may deal with any topic as long as it relates to the course's overall theme and includes at least one primary text drawn from each of the modules.
- There will be 2 midterm quizzes that will test content of assigned primary reading material. The quizzes will be on XXX and XXX respectively.
- -The research essay must be at least 2500 word long (excluding notes and bibliography) and must be based on solid research of at least 10 scholarly texts (excluding the minimum 3 primary texts) that will be fully cited in the body of the text and in the bibliography according to MLA format. Do not use encyclopedia, dictionaries, thesis abstracts, unpublished dissertations, or non-scholarly on-line sources. Any instance of plagiarism will result in a failing grade in the course. If you are uncertain about sources or citations, please ask.
- The MLA Bibliography is a useful source for ideas and research material for the essay. Try to use a variety of articles, chapters in books and books that are not necessarily available on-line.
- If you require assistance in choosing your research topic, please ask.
- All written work will be judged on originality and creativity, research, structure, style, and grammar. All written work must be in Spanish.
- The research essay must be handed in no later than XXX. Electronic submissions of any work will not be accepted nor will any other late work unless Senate approved reasons for granting an extension or accommodation are documented.

Communication: Face to face communication during office hours is best. Feel free to make an appointment if the time does not work for you. If necessary send me an email or leave a brief but clear phone message.

Definition of Plagiarism: Plagiarism is a major academic offense (see Scholastic Offense Policy in the Western Academic Calendar). Plagiarism is the inclusion of someone else's verbatim or paraphrased text in one's own written work without immediate reference. Verbatim text must be surrounded by quotation marks or indented if it is longer than four lines. A reference must follow right after borrowed material (usually the author's name and page number). Without immediate reference to borrowed material, a list of sources at the end of a written assignment does not protect a writer against the possible charge of plagiarism. The University of Western Ontario uses a plagiarism-checking site called Turnitin.com.
