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DESCRIPTION

Some mental states seem to represent or “say” something. For example, a perceptual experience of a cup on a table might represent that there is a cup on a table, and a belief that grass is green might represent the fact or proposition that grass is green. *This* is mental representation. This course examines the nature of this phenomenon. We will address questions such as the following:

- What is a theory of mental representation a theory *of*?
- What is the correct theory of mental representation?
- Can mental representation be explained in terms of physical phenomena?
- Does what a subject represents depend solely on how the subject is from the skin-in, or do environmental factors also play a role?
- Is mental representation a relation to a represented content, and, if so, what kinds of things are contents?
- What is the relationship between mental representation and phenomenal consciousness, the subjective, qualitative, or felt aspect of mental life? Can mental representation explain phenomenal consciousness? Can phenomenal consciousness explain mental representation?
- How can we explain the internal structure of complex representational states?

We will invite some of the authors of our readings to join us for a session each to discuss their work: **Cameron Buckner**, **Laura Gow**, and **David Pitt**. This is an opportunity to get to know them personally and to hear about their ideas first-hand.

This course is an online course. It has both synchronous components (i.e., occurring at a particular time) and asynchronous components (i.e., completed on your own time). **Attending class meetings is highly recommended. If you cannot attend class meetings, please email the instructor to discuss alternatives.**

OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, you should be able to explain and evaluate the main philosophical arguments and positions discussed in this course both orally and in writing. You should acquire and/or improve upon general skills useful for critically engaging with philosophical ideas as well as other pursuits, including analyzing, and critically evaluating arguments, skills involved in effective oral and written communication, and fruitful engagement with peers.

REQUIREMENTS

Final paper (3500–5000 words) or take-home exam	80%
Presentation (graded pass/fail)	10%
10 responses (graded pass/fail, 200–500 words)	10%

Students who are unable to complete the presentation because they cannot make it to the course meeting time should contact the instructor for an alternative assignment.
