Philosophy 2555F: Phenomenology and Existentialism

Fall Term 2015 Instructor: Dean Proessel

DESCRIPTION

This course focuses on some of the major philosophers of the existentialist movement, including most notably Kierkegaard, Nietzsche, Heidegger and Sartre. We will examine different ways these philosophers challenge traditional dualisms between mind and matter, subject and object, and how, in doing so, they provide us new and insightful ways of thinking about the conditions of human existence and what it means to transcend and create meaning out of these conditions. Accordingly, our investigation will include questions such as: What is our relation to the world and how does the world take on meaning in our everyday lives? What is freedom? To what extent is our freedom shaped by the world and others? Who is the other and what role do others play in our lives? What is religious faith? And how does living in a secular society transform what it means to be ethically responsible? What might it mean to live authentically?

OBJECTIVES

- Understand the challenge existentialist philosophers pose to the *scientism* of the modern worldview.
- Develop an understanding of what is meant by a phenomenological investigation.
- Understand the significance of one's embodied lived experience and how perception is shaped by language, culture and forms of life.
- Develop skills of phenomenological analysis by preparing two written assignments.
