DESCRIPTION

This introduction to philosophy of science explores how philosophical questions are linked to sciences. Over the course of the semester we will look at examples of success and failures in science and reflect on issues such as: What are the aims of science? What demarcates science from pseudoscience? Does science progress? Are sciences unified? How historical and social contexts affect the work of scientists? These questions will be explored through wide range of topics that became the center of attention in the natural and social sciences, including climate change, evolution, genetics, race, biodiversity, the Copernican revolution, medical research priorities, and the place of women in science.

OBJECTIVES

This course is designed to immerse students in a wide range of scientific disciplines and philosophical issues arising within them. Yet, no prior background in science is necessary. Only a willingness to engage in philosophical reflection and a curiosity to explore science from different viewpoints is required. At the end of this course, students will have a broad understanding of some of the core questions that marked the history of philosophy of science. Students will discover the fascinating and thriving world of philosophy of science through engaging and structured in-class discussions. This course is thus a great opportunity for students to develop advanced critical thinking and communicative skills, including 1) identifying, evaluating, and formulating philosophical issues related to diverse scientific inquiries, 2) writing balanced and well-supported argumentative essays, 3) leading a focused discussion on issues related to reading materials, and 4) presenting and challenging ideas in a respectful and constructive way.

REQUIREMENTS

The final grade will be based upon the following scheme:

1. **Mid-term paper** (6-8 pages) on an issue of your choice discussed during the first half of the course. Due by the end of week 7. (30%) Make sure to look at the guideline for writing philosophical paper on OWL.
2. **Term paper** (10-12 pages) on an issue of your choice discussed during the second half of the semester. Due by the last day of regular class. (40%) Make sure to look at the guideline for writing philosophical paper on OWL.
3. **Issue of the week**
Every Wednesday a new topic will be introduced by the instructor. Students will then have to read the material related to the topic and formulate an interesting and engaging issue for the discussion that will take place the following Monday. The issue you formulate should show that you have engaged with the readings. **Your issue must be sent to the instructor (by email) by Sunday evening.** (10%)
4. **Participation**
Each Monday will be devoted to a group discussion based on issues arising from the reading materials and the topic introduced the previous Wednesday. Active participation in these discussions is mandatory. (20%)
