Philosophy 2265F: Talking Philosophy

DESCRIPTION

A very first introduction to philosophy of language, this course will focus on two sets of fascinating issues about "talk". The first are issues at the intersection of language with philosophy of mind and knowledge, such as: the nature of human language; knowledge of language and how it is acquired; and the relationship between language and perception/thought. The second are issues at the intersection of language with ethics and social issues, such as: prohibitions on pornography and hate speech; gender-neutral language; and the purported "decline of English grammar".

The course is focused on "talk" in another sense. Rather than lectures, there is a heavy emphasis on in-class discussion.

REQUIRED TEXTS

None. The course will draw heavily on web-based media.

OBJECTIVES

The stress in this class is not on memorization of lectures, but on self-directed learning, honing of transferable skills, and mastery of useful concepts. The skills include close-reading of arguments, oral debate, and careful, clear writing. The concepts include tools from philosophy generally (such as fallacies to avoid, conceptual analysis, and kinds of reasons), but also from the humanistic and scientific study of human language.

In brief, though "philosopher's findings about talk" will play an important role, the ability to "talk philosophically" will be stressed at least as much.
