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DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory course in formal logic. The focus of the course is on Modern Symbolic Logic. The first term focuses solely on propositional or sentential logic; the second term is dedicated to first-order predicate logic. A system of natural deduction is introduced for proving statements and assessing natural language arguments. A formal language is introduced along with techniques for translating between this formal system and natural language. Truth tables are used to test for truth-functional properties. A more efficient system of truth trees is then introduced to test for these properties. Time permitting the course will conclude with a brief introduction to modal and other alternative logics.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Improve critical reasoning skills
- 2. Learn formal systems of propositional and first-order predicate logic
- 3. Learn to translate between ordinary language and formal language
- 4. Use truth tables to test for truth-functional properties
- 5. Learn to use formal trees to test for various logical properties
- 6. Learn formal proof methods and use them to test argument validity

REQUIREMENTS

Weekly Assignments 40%

(20% per term, with the highest 10 assignments counting for the grade)

First Term Midterm Examination 10%

(1 hour exam during class time)

Midyear Examination 20%

(2 hour exam)

Second Term Midterm Examination 10%

(1 hour exam during class time)

Final Examination 20%

(2 hour exam; students who have completed at least 70% of all assignments and both midterms and the midyear examination who receive a higher grade on the final examination than their cumulative average for the year may count the final examination for 100% of their course grade)

Students wishing to audit the course should consult with the instructor prior to or during the first week of classes.

EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

At least three days prior to the deadline for withdrawal from a course without academic penalty, students will receive assessment of work accounting for at least 15% of their final grade. For 3000- or 4000-level courses in which such a graded assessment is impracticable, the instructor(s) must obtain an exemption from this policy from the Dean and this exemption must be noted on the corresponding course syllabus. In rare instances and at the Dean's discretion, other courses could receive a similar exemption, which also must be noted in the course syllabus.
