PHILOSOP 2400G Introduction to Philosophy of Mind

PREREQUISITES

This course has no formal prerequisites.

DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction to the philosophy of mind. It covers a broad range of traditional questions in this field, such as:

- What is a mind or a mental state?
- Can mental states be explained in the same way as other things (such as the motion of physical bodies)?
- Do we really know what others feel or experience?
- What is the relationship between sensory experience and thought?
- What is a person and under what conditions does a person continue to exist?
- Does the determinism of physics imply that we have no free will?

OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, you should be able to explain and evaluate the main philosophical arguments and positions discussed in this course both orally and in writing. You should acquire and/or improve upon general skills useful for critically engaging with philosophical ideas as well as other pursuits, including analyzing, and critically evaluating arguments, skills involved in effective oral and written communication, and fruitful engagement with peers.

METHOD OF EVALUATION

- Two short essays of 1250 words each:

- The first essay, worth 40% of the mark, is due 10 days before the last day for dropping the course without penalty (actual date to be announced).
- o The second essay, worth 60% of the mark, is due on the last day of classes.
- o Essay topics are assigned.
- o Topics typically have the form "Explained and discuss critically position X". Students are expected to summarize the material learned in the course.
- Essays must be submitted on OWL as MS Word (preferred) or PDF documents.
- o The late penalty is 3% per day.

ONLINE FORMAT

This course is taught entirely online through asynchronous presentations.

Students wishing to audit the course should consult with the instructor prior to or during the first week of classes.
