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DESCRIPTION

Ancient Greek philosophy—and some say, philosophy itself—reached its zenith with the arrival of Aristotle. Aristotle is arguable the most influential and prolific thinker in the history of human thought. His ideas revolutionized practically every area of inquiry from logic to biology to psychology to politics. This course will provide students with an introduction to the major themes in the Aristotelian corpus. Sections include: metaphysics and ontology; philosophy of science; nature, change, and explanation; life and living things; psychology (including sense-perception, memory, and the psychology of dreaming); ethics and politics (including Aristotle's theory of pleasure, constitutional theory, and the causes of political revolutions).

This is a blended course. One hour per week will be online, during which time students are expected to listen to the weekly podcast-style lectures (available on OWL). The two hours of in-person class will be devoted to discussion of the course material.

OBJECTIVES

This course has two objectives. The first is to give students of philosophy an introduction to the origins and foundations of their discipline, including the problems that define it. The second is to help students develop their ability to read and understand difficult philosophical texts and to reflect on the ideas and arguments they offer us. These are basic skills that every well-rounded philosopher should have.
