## PHILOSOP 2065G Evil, Suffering, and Pessimism: An Introduction to Modern Philosophy

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

A study of philosophical approaches to evil through the history of modern Western philosophy. We will consider evil as a theological problem (i.e., the problem of evil, optimism, and philosophical attempts at theodicy and objections to these), the origin and significance of suffering, and philosophical responses to the fact of evil and suffering, especially pessimism (the view that this is the "worst of all possible worlds").

#### LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students successfully completing this course will:

(1) be familiar with many of the principal philosophers of the modern period (1500-1900) in Western philosophy

(2) have demonstrated an ability to comprehend and reflect upon complex philosophical arguments,

(3) be able to write short, argumentative papers

If you have made use of AI tools for your essay assignment you are required to specify the purposes for which you have used it in your paper itself (in, for instance, an initial footnote). Your final assignments should in any case reflect your own critical thinking and independent work.

# ACADEMIC CONSIDERATION

Students may request academic consideration in cases of extenuating circumstances – that is, personal circumstances beyond the student's control that have a substantial but temporary impact on the student's ability to meet essential academic requirements.

1. Requests for academic consideration are made to the Academic Advising office of Faculty in which the student is registered.

- 2. Requests for academic consideration include the following components:
  - a. Self-attestation signed by the student;
  - b. Indication of the course(s) and assessment(s) relevant to the request;
  - c. Supporting documentation as relevant

Requests without supporting documentation are limited to one per term per course.

Documentation for medical illness, when required, includes the completion of a <u>Western</u> <u>Student Medical Certificate (SMC)</u> or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation, by a health care practitioner. Requests linked to examinations scheduled by the Office of the Registrar during official examination periods as well as practice laboratory and performance tests typically scheduled in the last week of term always require formal supporting documentation.
