3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

An exploration of socio-scientific issues facing humanity, including climate change, world hunger, energy/water availability and habitat loss. The interdisciplinary nature and interconnectivity of these issues will be discussed. Students will access the scientific literature and government reports, critically evaluate the data presented and use it to develop cogent arguments.

Learning Outcomes:

Classroom and tutorial sessions are intended to help students develop skills in:

- 1. Demonstrating understanding of how the environment intersects with students' respective specializations
- 2. Critically evaluating how science and society interact with the environment
- 3. Summarizing ideas in environment and sustainability, in a way that is suitable for a scientific as well as a general audience
- 4. Working collaboratively to prepare a presentation on a specific environmental topic
- 5. Writing a formal paper with critical analysis of a specific environmental topic
- 6. Sharing ideas with peers in a moderated discussion setting
- 7. Providing and incorporating feedback on written work in a collaborative setting
- 8. Communicating scientific ideas with scientists from other areas of specialization

Furthermore, by the end of the course, students will be expected to be able to discuss and answer questions based on:

- 1. The value provided by the environment
- 2. Different environmental perspectives and the regulation of the environment and valuable ecosystems in Canada
- 3. The importance of biodiversity from the genetic level to the whole ecosystem
- 4. Sources of pollution in the air, water, and on land
- 5. Human influence on the degradation of the environment
- 6. The causes and consequences of climate change
- 7. Renewable and non-renewable energy sources, where they are most prominent and the climate consequences of each
- 8. How the environment, technology and society intersect

Contingency plan

Although the intent is for this course to be delivered in person, should any university-declared emergency require some or all of the course to be delivered online, either synchronously or asynchronously, the course will adapt accordingly. The grading scheme will not change. Any assessments affected will be conducted online as determined by the course instructor.

The overall course grade will be calculated as follows:

Forum posts: There will be 12 forum posts, 1 each week. The best 10 will be counted towards your final grade (the lowest 2 will be dropped). The posts will be related to readings or other media (e.g., videos).

Assignments: As indicated in the class schedule, will be based on activities during tutorial periods and are due the following week unless indicated otherwise.

Group presentations: Group members have been randomly assigned to 6 teams. Your group will choose a topic related to environmental sustainability and prepare 2 presentations during the semester. You'll have 15 minutes for the presentation, plus some time for questions.

Individual essay: You will write an essay or report $(1500 \pm 200 \text{ words})$ on the topic of your group presentation. You are welcome to discuss ideas with your group members, but your essay/report must be original and submitted individually.

Attendance at lectures is **highly** recommended. However, we are still in a global pandemic. If you are unwell, **please do NOT come to class**, even if you are wearing a mask. To facilitate absences due to illness, participation will be assessed using the online Forum (the lowest score will be dropped). Contact your instructor if you have questions, for example, if you must be absent during an exam or group presentation. If you are unable to meet a course requirement due to illness or other serious circumstances, please follow the procedures below.

General information about missed coursework

This policy does not apply to requests for Academic Consideration submitted for **attempted or completed work**, whether online or in person.

All requests for Academic Consideration must be made within 48 hours after the assessment date or submission deadline.

All Academic Consideration requests normally must include supporting documentation; however, recognizing that formal documentation may not be available in some extenuating circumstances, the policy allows students to make <u>one</u> Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** in this course. However, the following assessments are excluded from this, and therefore always require formal supporting documentation:

Group presentations are one of the milestones in the course and always require documentation when requesting Academic Consideration. This includes the first and second presentations. Under special circumstances, if the instructor is informed in advance, a student may join the presentation remotely (if the technology is available in the classroom) without seeking Academic Consideration.

This is an **essay** course, so failing to submit your essay is simply not an option. Students are expected to submit the final essay by March 28 (earlier submissions are encouraged!). Should extenuating circumstances arise, students **do not** need to request Academic Consideration and are permitted to submit their essay up to 72 hours past the deadline without a late penalty. If a student submits their assessment beyond 72 hours past the deadline, a late penalty of 10% per day will be applied. Academic Consideration requests may be granted only for extenuating circumstances that <u>started before</u> the deadline and <u>last longer</u> than the No-Late-Penalty Period. Please note that it is University policy that all course work must be submitted by the last day of classes (April 4).

When a student <u>mistakenly</u> submits their <u>one</u> allowed Academic Consideration request **without** supporting documentation for the assessments listed above or those in the Coursework with

Assessment Flexibility section below, <u>the request cannot be recalled and reapplied</u>. This privilege is forfeited.

Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments

The lowest 2 **forum posts** (including those not submitted) will be dropped. Should extenuating circumstances arise, students <u>do not</u> need to request Academic Consideration for the first 2 missed forum posts. Academic consideration requests will be denied for the first 2 missed posts. Late forum posts will receive a deduction of 1 point per day.

Assignments are due the following week unless otherwise indicated. Should extenuating circumstances arise, students do not need to request Academic Consideration and are permitted to submit their assignment up to 72 hours past the deadline without a late penalty. If a student submits their assessment beyond 72 hours past the deadline, a late penalty of 10% per day will be applied. No assignments can be accepted after graded submissions have been returned to the rest of the class.

When a student misses the **Final Exam** and their Academic Consideration has been granted, they will be allowed to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam). See the Academic Calendar for details (under <u>Special Examinations</u>), especially for those who miss multiple final exams within one examination period.

Essential Learning Requirements

Even when Academic Considerations are granted for missed coursework, the following are deemed essential to earn a passing grade in the course:

- a passing grade on the final essay as this course is designated as an "essay course"
- 50% on the final exam (or Special Exam, with Academic Consideration)

If you do not meet **both** of these requirements, you will not pass the course.

Coursework with Assessment Flexibility

By policy, instructors may deny Academic Consideration requests for the following assessments with built-in flexibility:

- Forum posts
- Assignments
- Essays

Grades <u>will not be adjusted</u> on the basis of need. It is important to monitor your performance in the course. Remember: *You* are responsible for your grades in this course.
