### WELCOME TO TRAVEL LIGHT

In its return since the COVID-19 pandemic, Travel Light: Apprehending Being on the Move is the 2023 iteration of the Annual Graduate Conference. This year, the team is comprised of: Shahrzad Izadpanah and Marziyeh Ghoreishi (Comparative Literature), Hanna Barnett and Lorena Rojas Castañeda (Hispanic Studies), and Brendan Brown and Shubhayan Chakrabarti (The Centre for the Study of Theory and Criticism). Our theme was inspired by a restlessness that only can be understood through the now quotidian lens of global lockdowns during COVID-19. The prohibition of large-scale ambulation meant that movement, previously ubiquitous, leaped forth anew with potentialities previously hidden in the patterns of everyday life. Therefore, we sought to draw together various thinkers, writers, and scholars engaged in the critical project of understanding and analyzing non-normative approaches to speed, vectorial choreography, migration, and even stasis-as-movement. Intersecting these inquiries were concerns for tangible and measurable justice-oriented modalities of praxis. No more are we content with the simple static relation of thought to action. This conference, instead, is pushing theory to chase after movement. Playing on the polysemantic interpretations of 'traveling light', we are eager to learn, listen, and follow along with the exciting presentations gathered here. We would like to thank the keynote speakers, presenters, moderators, volunteers, graduate chairs, and staff (Sylvia Kontra and Dawn Gingerich) who have all made this conference possible.
